Last Wednesday, Luisa Fernandez-Willey, AAR AVP of Policy & Economics, joined "Link L.I.V.E." to discuss rail trends, impacts from supply chain disruptions, opportunities for 2021 and more.


"The Class I railroads indicated a sense of optimism for 2021, at least for the second half of the year," <u>said Fernandez-Willey</u>. "They are still a little cautious about the first quarter, due to the lockdowns currently in place across several different states where they operate. The fortunes of the railroad industry rise and fall with the U.S. economy"

*Virginia Mercury* took a look at the effect crew size legislation could have on the future of American rail, the economy and our climate. "Pushing forth undue crew size requirements would only hinder the ability for trains to be more competitive and would result in more goods being transported by trucks and thus higher carbon emissions," <u>said AAR AVP</u> <u>of Communications Ted Greener</u>. "That doesn't square with our long-term climate goals or having a competitive rail sector."
